FROM OUR PASTOR

A little girl died in an Auburn foster home. As I write this, we do not know how the girl died. This incident prompted me to write about my experiences with the foster care system. Some of these stories will be hard to read. I was a foster parent for close to a decade when I was in South Dakota. I mostly got middle school boys. Three boys I had for over a year and continued to have on holidays and in the summer until they turned eighteen and left the system. Each of those boys went back to their families when they turned eighteen.

I housed three other boys for over a month and had six others for a night or two on an emergency basis. So altogether I had twelve foster boys in my house, including one Thanksgiving when I had five boys in my house aged eleven-nineteen. That was a loud Thanksgiving. Oh, and my house was supposed to have a maximum of two kids in it.

I do not know what happened to most of my foster kids after they stayed with me. That is because the child welfare system keeps everything they can confidential, a fancy word for secret. I think they keep things secret because if the world knew how we treated foster kids there would be riots.

I think things are kept secret to hide the misdeeds of adults, not to protect the privacy of the kids. Judges drag cases on; lawyers play games. Case workers fail to visit and file paperwork in a timely manner. Instead of putting the needs of children first, too often the adults put their own needs and wants first. I know I did that. I was often the last foster home before a placement, a fancy word for orphanage/counseling center. When a boy got too hard for me to handle, or was hurting my life or job, I would ask for them to be moved out of my house. I agonized over those decisions; would I give up if he was my "real" son? I cannot answer that question. I hope I treated the boys like my "real" sons but I can't be sure. It is the nature of humanity that even those dedicated to doing good can be overcome by the sins of greed, sloth, and selfishness; especially if there is not enough accountability in the system and I do not think there is.

We know the foster system is broken. Every show or movie about the system talks about abuse and neglect in the system. Several movies portray foster kids better off if they run away, *Hotel for Dogs* being one that comes immediately to mind. Even parents that cannot care for or even abuse their children act like the foster care system is bad. Part of that is the delusions these parents live under that they are good parents. For example, I had a parent tell me cigarette burns were good for his son. So burning his son was love, not abuse.

The system is set up so those who work the hardest get paid the least. Foster parents in South Dakota made about \$14 a day per child. A placement cost \$8-10,000 a month, so district managers really wanted me to keep boys in my home whose next stop was a placement, because too many placements ruined the district budget.


Case workers, district managers, lawyers and judges all made good money off the foster care system but foster parents were only "reimbursed" at a rate some bureaucrat decided it cost to care for a child. Well that bureaucrat never factored in that almost every kid came to me with only the clothes on their back. Clothes and shoes were always worn out and/or too small. Every emergency placement I received, first got fed (often they had spent most of the day in DCF offices with no lunch or supper) then it was off to the 24 hour Walmart to buy clothes for the morning. Many foster parents I knew kept dressers full of clothes for all ages, clothes they had picked up at yard sales and thrift stores. All these purchases were over and above what the state "paid" us.

There was only one dentist in South Dakota that would treat foster kids, luckily he was in my town. No other dentist was willing to do the work for the paltry pay from the state.

Time and again, we hear that foster kids are all accounted for. That is true as long as you know "knowing where the kids are" means knowing a lot of teens have run away. My youngest son ran away to Minneapolis and stayed on the streets for over half a year until he turned eighteen. He was on the Minnesota streets for a full winter, but in some bureaucrat's book I am sure his name was marked down as "runaway" so that counted as knowing where he was when, in fact, they had no idea where he had run to.

Dear Pumpkin Patch Partner,

My name is Harry Descheene. I am the Human Resources Director for Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers. I've been with Pumpkin Patch, off and on, for 22 years. I would like to thank you as Pumpkin Patch Partners for participating in the project and to let you know what your participation helps provide to Native Americans.

I am a Navajo, living on the reservation all of my life (56 years). Pumpkin Patch has been employing Native Americans here on the reservation for over 20 years. Our staff here in New Mexico is 100% Navajo, including all management. During the harvest we also hire Pueblo, both Zuni and Hopi tribes (300 workers). Unemployment on the Navajo reservation is 42%.

My experience as an employee and manager is that Pumpkin Patch goes above and beyond what any organizations of the reservation do to take care of their employees. Pumpkin Patch pays for the transportation of their employees from all of the different reservations, some as far as 4 hours away. Pumpkin Patch also provides residential facilities (dorms), laundry facilities, recreational facilities, an upscale kitchen with a chef and kitchen staff, a huge dining hall, extensive safety orientation before workers actually begin field work. Transportation is also provided to and from the fields. After completion of the harvest season, all workers are provided with transportation back to their communities.

For many of our workers, it's the only opportunity to provide for their families and themselves. The approximately 1.3 million dollars in harvest labor makes a significant difference in the quality of the lives of my people. Opportunities like this are very scarce on our reservations.

I grew up tending livestock on the reservation, went to boarding school and worked in local government as an elected official in the capacity of chapter president for 12 years. My salary and benefits with Pumpkin Patch are substantially above what I might receive from other private enterprises in the Farmington area. I have found that the owners of Pumpkin Patch are extremely concerned with the welfare of all of their employees, both full and part-time.

Another important aspect of Pumpkin Patch is the donations that they make to local organizations. Thousands of school children, senior citizen centers, special education and handicapped facilities, behavioral health facilities, church organizations, government services, correctional youth services and civic groups receive free pumpkins for their causes.

Again, let me say that I cannot understate the value of the service and work provided to the Navajo people by Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers and its non-profit partners.

What is Relay For Life?

The American Cancer Society Relay For Life is a life-changing event that gives everyone in communities across the globe a chance to <u>celebrate</u> the lives of people who have battled cancer, <u>remember</u> loved ones lost, and <u>fight back</u> against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at a local high school, park, or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps, Relays are overnight events up to 24 hours in length.

Relay began in 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt*, a colorectal surgeon in Tacoma, Washington, ran and walked around a track for 24 hours to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Since then, Relay has grown from a single man's passion to fight cancer, into the world's largest movement to end the disease. Each year, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities in the United States, along with additional communities in 19 other countries, gather to take part in this global phenomenon and raise much-needed funds and awareness to save lives from cancer. Thanks to Relay participants, we are creating a world with more birthdays, a world where cancer can't claim another year of anyone's life. We invite all cancer survivors in the community to attend Relay For Life because they are the reason we Relay.

September 2015

It is time for the Church year to start again. Rally Day, the start of Sunday school, will be the 13th of September. The choir will start the same time. We will have our first Church supper on Saturday, September 19th. We will have our first spirit potluck supper in September as well (on the 24th). We are moving the suppers to either Wednesdays or Thursdays this year. Our first book will be the book of the Prophet Hosea.

Hosea is one of the 12 lesser prophets. So called, because they all fit on one scroll; so they are lesser because they are brief. Hosea is 14 chapters and each chapter is about a page. The first verse of the book starts as most books of Jewish prophecy do by setting the dates the prophet lived.

The word of the LORD that came to Hose'a the son of Be-e'ri, in the days of Uzzi'ah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezeki'ah, kings of Judah, and in the days of Jerobo'am the son of Jo'ash, king of Israel.

Those reigns are 792-722 BC, 722 being about the time the Assyrians conquered the 10 northern tribes of Israel and made them the famous 10 lost tribes of Israel. What caused the loss of the ten tribes? We read it in the very next verse. The main story of Hosea is why it is not read much. The second verse of Hosea talks about how Hosea's marriage troubles mimic God's troubles with being God (husband) to an unfaithful people (bride). So in our first bible reading of the year we will talk about the symbolism of God the husband and the people of God as a wife, a not very loyal and faithful wife at that.

The first Saturday in October (the 3rd) will be busy with the pumpkins due in, our usual sleepover to start Youth on a Mission, and there's a wedding that afternoon.

Once again, the fall gets busy right away.

On behalf of my mother and me. I would like to thank you all for your prayers, well wishes, and cards.

I will try to make a clear description of my mom's health issues. My mother is making a slow recovery. The main issue is her legs and feet are filled with fluid, making it even harder and more painful to walk than normal. She was basically immobile for a month before going into the hospital in late July. This fluid is hard to treat due to her other health problems, including blood clots, leaking heart values, a new diabetes diagnosis, and severe arthritis.

At this writing Mom is home and stable. We are working on getting her into a nursing home because it is hard for her to walk any distance.

The three boys I consider "my" sons all went back to their parents, at least two to be abused as adults. But there is something about family that called them back, and the people who cared or ignored or hurt them as little kids would always be their family. One Friday after Thanksgiving, I drove my oldest son up to his parents' place. My son was eleven and convinced his mom had died because he was not there to turn her over when she passed out drunk. He was eleven and in charge of making sure she did not choke to death. That was normal for him; that was family for him. At age twenty-five now, I am sure he is still trying to keep his mom from drinking herself to death. I just read that Rosie O'Donnell's adopted daughter returned to her birth mom after turning eighteen.

If I could wave a magic wand, I would put group homes on the grounds of prisons. Prisons that would only hold parents who abuse their children. The parents would be locked up, but the kids could see mom or dad anytime they wanted. Time and again, even little preschoolers would worry that mom or dad was hurt. Parole would mean living in a house with 24/7 surveillance and social workers living around the clock with the family.

I would also end confidentiality because it is hurting kids, not helping them. We need a foster care system that can get kids in good families to be good citizens. We need a foster care system that can find abuse before it cripples a child in mind, body, or soul. This is hard to do, but I think that is what we need to strive for.

Foster kids are wards of the state, like Robin was to Batman. They are our kids because we are the state. What would we not do for "our" kids? What would it be like if our foster kids had the same health care, housing, education and money as the sons and daughters of the governors, the senators, and the president?

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
