The only quiet time I get now is picking blueberries up North. My brother mentioned that blueberry picking was my Zen. I have no cell service in the town I grew up in. So the cell phone can’t draw my attention. Blueberry picking is a simple, useful thing. It does not take a lot of heavy thinking to pick the ripe blueberries. It is a simple, quiet activity.

Now the next part of an essay like this is to encourage us to make quiet time for our kids so they do not lose the valuable lessons quiet teaches us. Not going to go there. I am sure kids are bored even today with tablets and cell phones. I think kids are gonna be fine. They are still at the mercy of what parents want them to do so they have to check out from time to time.

Cell phones and tablets are not going to destroy childhood. If kids could survive living in mud huts while being hunted by saber-toothed tigers, if kids could survive working 16 hour days in textile mills, they can survive the digital age. I think kids find time to just veg out on a couch or on the lawn without adults needing to worry.

I worry more about adults. Do we ever unplug? Do we take a mental holiday? I hope so. God sometimes speaks in a still, soft voice, which is hard to hear when we are buried in our phone.

So, if your friend (or Pastor) does not respond to your text right away, maybe they are quietly contemplating the deep mysteries and they will get back to you later.



SUNDAY SCHOOL



Rally Day will be on September 9th. As we have in the past, we will celebrate the upcoming year with an ice cream social for the Sunday school kids downstairs in the old kitchen.

PARENTS: PLEASE ACCOMPANY YOUR CHILD/CHILDREN downstairs so YOU will be able to fill out the registration form. PLEASE leave extra time so that you will have time to complete registration for EACH child prior to going up to service. This is important for many reasons and safety is number one. I realize that many of you will be returning and probably not have any information change, but I need records for EACH year.

Also, please consider putting your name on the list to be a "floater" this year. Once I compile a list I will make a schedule so our Child Protection Policy will be covered each week. If we are not able to secure a "floater" for classes we may need to cancel Sunday school for that week and the children will be returned to you to attend service.

If you would like to volunteer for cradle roll, that will be a separate list and we usually use a rotating schedule, but we are open to you only helping out one time if that is your wish, just note that on the form. My goal is to have floaters and cradle roll schedules completed for the first half of the year by the end of September. If you are unable to attend on Rally Day, please be sure to register your child **prior** to you leaving them with a classroom teacher.


