#### From the Board of Trustees

August has been a busy month for the board of Trustees as we have been finalizing the plans to re-shingle the entire church roof. On August 22, the Trustees met to select a contractor for this work. This project will begin in October. As of August 22, we have received \$2,700 in roof donations towards the additional \$35,000 needed for the roof project. The entire project will cost \$60,000 to complete. The end result will be a 50 year roof that should give us years of trouble free maintenance. If you are planning on donating to the roof fund, please do so soon, so that we can reduce the amount of money that the church needs to borrow to complete this project.

#### **Library Tidings** By Gloria Whitehead

*Norman Gatreau's* books <u>Sea Room</u> and <u>Island of First Light</u> are on the move. These are the only two books that the author, who lives in Wakefield, MA, has written. Bob Koopman enjoyed <u>Island of First Light</u> so much that he wrote to *Mr. Gatreau* urging him to keep writing. Someone at Tatnuck Booksellers also wrote the author to say he'd be waiting for his next book. Good Testimonials? Category 1.

Pat Bukoski found <u>From Sea to Shinning Sea</u>, a treasury of American folklore, and folksongs, to be an interesting capture of the many cultures that blended to create the U.S.A. The catastrophies, challenges, ghost stories and much more, paint a sweeping portrait of our nation. It's beautifully illustrated by 11 Caldecott Medal and 4 Caldecott Honor Book artists. You'll find this book in Category 16 when it's not on display.

<u>Jubilee</u> by Margaret Walker was first placed in the library in 1969. It's an inch and a half thick and the sign out card(filled) is like a list of women in the church through the summer of 1988. However, there's a new sign out card and "this long absorbing book" is many things at once. It's a great Civil War novel based on the true life story of the author's great-grandmother. It's full of Civil War glamour and then it's collapse. But, it's most striking feature is that it's the first time this whole antebellum Civil War and Reconstruction story is told from the point of view of a Negro and written by a Negro woman.

With the humidity and heat, the Christmas books would probably have brought psychological relief. We kept so busy that we'll save the idea for another time.

You'll be thrilled, as we are, with the wonderful new cabinets Bob Johnson built for the right hand wall above the shelves in the Children's Library. A huge thank you to him AND to "Here We Grow"! For providing the finances for them. We're in the process of transferring books and supplies from the hall cabinets. By the time you receive this Tidings we should have <u>1776</u> by David McCullough available to borrow. It's considered by some to be a sequel to John Adams.

<u>The Seven Days of Creation</u> and <u>Jesus and the Seven Dudes Who Did</u> by Mindy MacDonald and Carole Murray's gift will be among the new children's books for various ages. They'll all be on display <u>for borrowing</u>! "Run away" with a book or be inspired by category #10 (Inspirational).




Our sympathies to Kathy Coleman and her two sons Sean and Ryan on the passing of her husband, Kevin McDuffee on June 28th. He was 49.
